Guiding Question	Who was William Shakespeare...really?
Lesson Summary	This is an introductory lesson for William Shakespeare's works and life in Elizabethan England. The students will assess prior knowledge, complete a web search of facts, and create learning cubes to share new knowledge.
Activating Strategy	<p>Four-Two-One Students should each receive a "Four-Two-One" handout. With higher level kids (and to save paper), you may have students draw their own.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. For one minute, have each student brainstorm "William Shakespeare" and write down four things that he or she has heard or knows about Shakespeare. 2. Have students partner with someone nearby, and together write down the two most accurate and informative sentences. (approx. 2 minutes) 3. Have these partners again partner (creating a group of four) and determine a single informative and (hopefully) accurate statement about William Shakespeare. (approx. 2 minutes) 4. Have one person from each group share the statements with the class. 5. Discuss accuracy and sources of information. Usually, students will discover that although they think they know a lot, they really don't...and some of what they "know" is inaccurate.
Cognitive Strategy	<p>WebQuest: Shakespeare Scavenger Hunt</p> <p>Students should have individual access to computers.</p> <p>Have students should use the internet sites provided to find the answers to the <i>Shakespeare Scavenger Hunt</i>.</p> <p>Discuss accuracy of information and site reliability. Discuss reading strategies (like inference) to determine answers.</p>
Summarizing Strategy	<p>Learning Cube</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Download and save the Learning Cube template for students to access in the computer lab. (Another option: Print a template for each student and allow students to complete the cube by hand.) 2. Divide students into groups of four. Each student should have a completed Scavenger Hunt and access to his/her own template. 3. Each student should design a "Title" side which includes "William Shakespeare" and his/her own name. 4. Have students discuss the following categories as they related to Shakespeare: Life, Works, Characters, England. 5. Each group should come up with 3-4 facts in each category. Working together, they should each write a different fact on the correct box on their own cubes.

	<ol style="list-style-type: none">6. The final side is for an interesting fact which has not been written elsewhere.7. Students should share cubes with the class.
Evaluation	Formal evaluation may be given for correct answers on the scavenger hunt. Informal evaluation may be done as students present their cubes. Completed cubes may be evaluated for correctness of information.

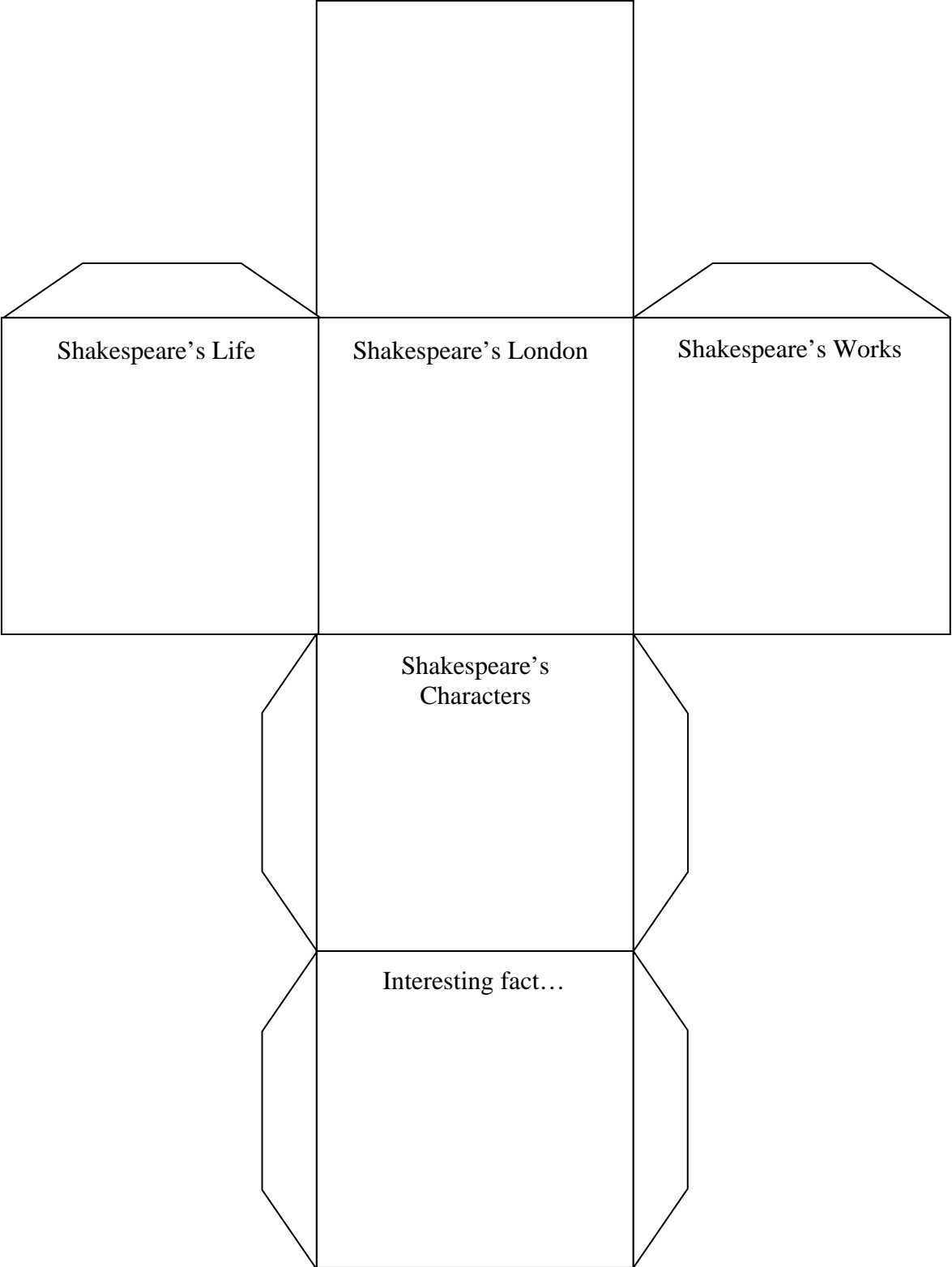
